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this book sheds light on experiences relatively underrepresented in academic and non academic sport history it examines how asian and pacific islander peoples used american football to maintain a sense of community while encountering racial exclusion labor exploitation and colonialism through their participation and spectatorship in american football asian and pacific islander people crossed treacherous cultural frontiers to construct what sociologist elijah anderson has called a cosmopolitan canopy under which asian americans pacific islanders and people of diverse racial and ethnic identities interacted with at least a semblance of respect and equity and perhaps a surprising number of asian americans and pacific islanders have excelled in college and even professional football before the 1960s finally acknowledging the impressive influx of elite pacific islander gridders who surfaced in the late twentieth and early twenty first century it is vital to note as well the

throughout its history as a social science demography has been associated with an exclusively quantitative orientation for studying social problems as a result demographers tend to analyse population issues scientifically through sets of fixed social categories that are divorced from dynamic relationships and local contexts and processes this volume questions these fixed categories in two ways first it examines the historical and political circumstances in which such categories had their provenance and second it reassesses their uncritical applications over space and time in a diverse range of empirical case studies encouraging throughout a constructive interdisciplinary dialogue involving anthropologists demographers historians and sociologists this volume seeks to examine the political complexities that lie at the heart of population studies by focusing

on category formation category use and category critique it shows that this takes the form of a dialectic between the needs for clarity of scientific and administrative analysis and the recalcitrant diversity of the social contexts and human processes that generate population change the critical reflections of each chapter are enriched by meticulous ethnographic fieldwork and historical research drawn from every continent this volume therefore exemplifies a new methodology for research in population studies one that does not simply accept and re use the established categories of population science but seeks critically and reflexively to explore test and re evaluate their meanings in diverse contexts it shows that for demography to realise its full potential it must urgently re examine and contextualize the social categories used today in population research

far from being an inevitably aggressive and destructive force nationalism is for ernst b haas the primary means of bringing coherence to modernizing societies in the second volume of his magisterial exploration of this topic haas emphasizes the benefits of liberal nationalism which he deems more progressive than other nation building formulas because it relies on reason to improve citizens lives the dismal fate of new nations considers several societies that modernized relatively recently many of them aroused to nationalism by the imperialism of the old nation states the book probes the different patterns of development in emerging countries iran egypt india brazil mexico china russia and ukraine for insights into the possibilities and limitations of all nationalisms especially liberal nationalism employing a systematic comparative perspective haas organizes the book around the notion of change and its management by political elites in asia eastern europe latin america and the middle east haas particularly wants to understand how nationalism plays out in the politics of modernization within non western cultures especially those where religions other than christianity predominate where the hold of religion remains formidable he argues the mixture of traditional and secular modernist institutions and beliefs will challenge the victory of liberal nationalism and the very success of nation state formation

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
