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over the decades we have heard a great deal about shaka the famous or infamous of zulu leaders it may come as a surprise therefore that we do not know when he was born nor what he looked like nor precisely when or why he was assassinated this book lays out the available evidence mainly hitherto under utilised zulu oral testimonies

this comprehensive and detailed exploration of the african past from prehistory to approximately 1870 is intended to provide a fully up to date complement to the cambridge history of africa reflecting several emphases in recent scholarship it focusses on the changing modes of production on gender relations and on ecology laying particular stress on viewing history from below a distinctive theme is to be found in its analyses of cognitive history the work falls into three sections the first comprises a historiographic analysis and covers the period from the dawn of prehistory to the end of the early iron age the second and third sections are for the most part organised on regional lines the second section ends in the sixteenth century the third carries the story on to 1870 a second volume now in preparation will cover the period from 1870 to 1995 this book attempts a more rounded view of african history than most of the other textbooks on the subject addressed to a largely undergraduate level student earlier histories have tended to ignore some of the current foci in the scholarly literature on africa generally not reflected in the textbooks these include discussions of topical issues like ecology and gender isichei s book is also more radical

between 1838 and 1888 the recently formed zulu kingdom in southeastern africa was directly challenged by the incursion of boer pioneers aggressively seeking new lands on which to set up their independent republics by english speaking traders and hunters establishing their neighboring colony and by imperial britain intervening in zulu affairs to safeguard britain s position as the paramount power in southern africa as a result the zulu fought to resist boer invasion in 1838 and british invasion in 1879 the internal strains these wars caused to the fabric of zulu society resulted in civil wars in 1840 1856 and 1882 1884 and zululand itself was repeatedly partitioned between the boers and british in 1888 the old order in zululand attempted a final unsuccessful uprising against recently imposed british rule this tangled web of invasions civil wars and rebellion is complex the historical dictionary of the zulu wars unravels and elucidates zulu history during the 50 years between the initial settler threat to the kingdom and its final dismemberment and

absorption into the colonial order a chronology an introductory essay a bibliography maps photos and over 900 cross referenced dictionary entries that cover the military politics society economics culture and key players during the zulu wars make this an important reference for everyone from high school students to academics

this book is an account of the history of the abathembu from the reign of ukumkani nxeko in c 1650 to the death of ukumkani dalindyebo in 1920 the importance of this cut off date lies in the fact that ukumkani dalindyebo s reign was characterised by relative stability compared to those of his predecessors his prestige however was demeaned by the department of native affairs secretary whose instruction was that ukumkani dalindyebo should not be addressed as a paramount chief as that title applied exclusively to the government thereby strengthening the government s position and elevating it to be above customary law abathembuland was and still is central to the history of the former transkei region and south africa not only does it form part of the former transkei region but it also constitutes south africa and so divisions conflicts developments and or underdevelopments in abathembuland inevitably affected not only the former transkei region but also the greater part of south africa in no small measure thus the history of abathembuland and the divisions thereof overlap with the history of the former transkei region and south africa

the teaching of history in south african and japanese schools has attracted sustained criticism for the alleged attempts to conceal the controversial aspects of their countries past and to inculcate ideologies favourable to the ruling regimes this book is the first attempt to systematically compare the ways in which education bureaucracy in both nations dealt with opposition and critics in the period from ca 1945 to 1995 when both countries were dominated by single party governments for most of the fifty years the author argues that both south african and japanese education bureaucracy did not overtly express its intentions in the curriculum documents or in the textbooks but found ways to enhance its authority through a range of often subtle measures a total of eight themes in 60 officially approved standard 6 south african and japanese middle school history textbooks have been selected to demonstrate the changes and continuity this work hopes to contribute to the existing literature of comparative history by drawing lessons that would probably not have emerged from the study of either country by itself

although chaka is considered an african literary masterpiece thomas mofolo has paradoxically been dismissed by critics as an author

naively extolling the virtues of the white man's civilizing mission in africa daniel m mengara's colonial discourse and the jesus fication of king chaka how thomas mofolo's chaka turned the zulu monarch into a messiah offers a rereading of chaka to show that mofolo in fact astutely deconstructs and then reconstructs zulu king chaka into a messianic figure whose life trajectory and destiny blasphemously mirror those of jesus christ this volume avoids the pitfalls of the traditional mission interpretations of chaka and provides an interpretative inflection that paints a more nuanced and balanced picture and understanding of thomas molofo's fictional account of the mythologized historical figure mengara delves into the circumstances and controversies surrounding the publication of the novel and shows how molofo jesus fied king chaka in a sly yet sacrilegious ploy to subvert the colonial discourse and missionary ethos of his time this book stands as a reassessment of thomas mofolo's often ignored nationalism and calls for a rediscovery of mofolo's work in ways that resituate him within the history of the african novel as the undisputed pioneer of engaged african literature

the anglo zulu war was one of many colonial campaigns in which the british army served as the instrument of british imperialism the conflict fought against a native adversary the british initially under estimated is remarkable for battles that included perhaps the most humiliating defeat in british military history the battle of isandlwana january 22 1879 and one of its most heroic feats of martial arms the defense of rorke's drift january 22 23 1879 while lasting only six months it is one of the most examined studied and debated conflicts in victorian military history anglo zulu war 1879 a selected bibliography is a research guide and tool for identifying obscure publications and source materials in order to encourage continued original and thought provoking contributions to this popular field of historical study from the student or neophyte to the study of the anglo zulu war its battles and its opponents to the more experienced historian or scholar this selected bibliography is a must for anyone interested in the 1879 anglo zulu war

the idea that the period of social turbulence in the nineteenth century was a consequence of the emergence of the powerful zulu kingdom under shaka has been written about extensively as a central episode of southern african history considerable dynamic debate has focused on the idea that this period the mfecane left much of the interior depopulated thereby justifying white occupation one view

is that the time of troubles owed more to the delagoa bay slave trade and the demands of the labour hungry cape colonists than to shaka s empire building but is there sufficient evidence to support the argument the mfecane aftermath investigates the very nature of historical debate and examines the uncertain foundations of much of the previous historiography
