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responsibility participation and choice are key policy framings of active citizenship summoning the citizen to take on new roles in welfare state reform this volume traces the emergence of new discourses and the ways in which they take up and rework struggles of social movements for greater independence power and control it explores the changing cultural and political inflections of active citizenship in germany finland norway the netherlands france italy and the uk with ethnographic research complementing policy analysis the editors then look across the volume to assess some of the tensions and contradictions arising in the turn to active citizenship two final chapters address the reworking of citizen professional relationships and the remaking of public private and personal responsibilities with a particular focus on the contribution of feminist research and theory

recently there has been a growing interest not only in existentialism but also in existential questions as well as key figures in existential thinking yet despite this renewed interest a systematic reconsideration of kierkegaard s existential approach is missing this anthology is the first in a series of three that will attempt to fill this lacuna the 13 chapters of the first anthology deal with various aspects of kierkegaard s existential approach its reception will be examined in the works of influential philosophers such as heidegger gadamer and habermas as well as in lesser known philosophers from the interwar period such as jean wahl lev shestov and benjamin fondane other chapters reconsider central notions such as anxiety existence imagination and despair finally some chapters deal with kierkegaard s relevance for central issues in contemporary philosophy including naturalism self constitution and bioethics this book is of relevance not only to researchers working in kierkegaard studies but to anyone with an interest in existentialism and existential thinking

welfare to work programmes aim to assist the long term unemployed in finding work increasing labour market flexibility eliminating dependency and tackling social exclusion they have been implemented in many western countries this book focuses on an important and novel feature of these programmes they replace the rights based entitlements that have characterized the welfare state for decades with conditional rights dependent on the fulfilment of obligations conditions are attached to the benefits received this new type of social contract between the claimant and the state carries with it a new construction of the relationship between rights and responsibilities and a new interpretation of citizenship paz fuchs examines the theoretical underpinnings of welfare to work programmes incorporating a comparative analysis of the uk and usa where the ideal of social citizenship is being curtailed through welfare reforms he argues that when the rhetoric of the social contract is used to imply a continuous contract between citizens and the state a vast array of conditions on welfare can be legitimated including workfare the obligation to accept any job offer and moral and social preconditions that are based on a vague notion of reciprocity paz fuchs argues by contrast that conditional welfare undermines civil rights such as the right to privacy and family life by requiring welfare claimants to change their behaviour he contends that strengthening welfare rights and relaxing preconditions on entitlement would better serve the objectives that welfare to work programmes are supposed to advance

although formally equal relations between citizens are actually characterised by many and varied forms of inequality rethinking equality provides a clear critical and very up to date account of the most important contemporary egalitarian theories

what should i do how should i deal with this how should i behave how should i act we ask ourselves daily but this is only the first part of the sentence while the full sentence is what should i do to achieve such and such for example to complete an assigned task to do well before my boss or a client to be pleased with myself to carry out my plans to make money in

the stock market to pass an exam to complete an application etc these and similar questions that people ask consciously or not openly or not are decisions what skills must we master especially when there is a need to make not only elementary decisions but also decisions that affect the existence health and even lives of people first laszlo zsolnai writes that we should acquire the skill of gaining knowledge only then will we stand a chance of reacting to things that are improbable today but could become a fact tomorrow also essential is the skill of designing i e preparing actions conceptually in order to make decisions before irreversible changes occur finally it is essential to master the skill of multidimensional judgment within the space defined by effectiveness efficiency and ethics this is zsolnai s attempt to build a model of making ethical decisions both effectively and efficiently therefore the model is much broader than purely an analytical framework would be it must tell us how to act rather than limit us to reflection on actions already performed it must combine decision and praxiological analysis of human conduct the proposed model enlarges the scope of the debate and suggests new avenues of both rational and responsible decision making this is an original statement of the crossover of policy and morality

this introduction just aims to be a fast foreword to the special topic now turned into an e book the editorial decision making experiments under a philosophical analysis human choice as a challenge for neuroscience alongside with my opinion article neurophilosophical considerations on decision making pushing up the frontiers without disregarding their foundations play the real role of considering in more details the articles and the whole

purpose of this e book what i must highlight in this foreword is that our intention with such a project was to deepen into the very foundations of our current paradigms in decision neuroscience and to philosophically moot its foundations and repercussions normal science a term coined by philosopher thomas kuhn works under a research consensus among a scientific community a shared paradigm consolidated methods widespread convictions pragmatically winning formulas must be kept although not at any cost what differentiates a gifted and revolutionary scientist from a more bureaucratic colleague is the capacity and willingness of constantly reevaluating depurating and refining his her own paradigm that is best strategy to avoid that a paradigm itself would gradually come under challenge in my view some achievements in this sense were brought about in our project the e book will be inspiring and informative for both neuroscientists that are concerned with the very foundations of their works and for philosophers that are not blind to empirical evidence kant once said thoughts without content are empty intuitions without concepts are blind paraphrasing kant we could say philosophy without science is empty science without philosophy is blind

katherin a rogers presents a new theory of free will based on the thought of anselm of canterbury we did not originally produce ourselves yet according to anselm we can engage in self creation freely and responsibly forming our characters by choosing from ourselves a se between open options anselm introduces a new agent causal libertarianism which is parsimonious in that unlike other agent causal theories it does not appeal to any unique and mysterious powers to explain how the free agent chooses after setting out anselm s original theory rogers defends and develops it by addressing a series of standard problems levelled against libertarianism these include the problem of internalism in that an agent is not the source of his original motivations how can the structure of his choice ground his responsibility the problem of frankfurt style counterexamples do we really need open options to choose

freely and the problem of luck if nothing about an agent before he chooses explains his choice then isn t the choice just dumb luck the anselmian answer to this perennial criticism is especially innovative proposing that the critic has the relationship between choices and character exactly backwards finally as a theory about self creation anselmian libertarianism must defend the tracing thesis the claim that an agent can be responsible for character determined choices if he himself formed his character through earlier a se choices throughout the book defends and exemplifies a new methodological suggestion someone debating free will ought to make his background world view explicit in the on going debate over the possibility of human freedom and responsibility anselmian libertarianism constitutes a new and plausible approach

this essay is a game and like all games it sets some rules in this book i m not going to distinguish between dr gregory house s line of thought and that of the series creator david shore just as students of socrates are obliged to ignore the distinction between socrates and plato s ideas in both cases one is dealing with virtual characters in house s case it s obvious that as a fictional character he doesn t exist as such rather he s a person through which a team of screenwriters voice their ideas in each episode these reflections are re worked around a single plotline a mix of character and physical being in line with a narrative project in socrates case it s more or less the same thing with plato constructing a fiction as a vehicle for his ideas on important philosophical questions the fiction meant here as a performance of characters some fictional others based on real people representing divergent and often contradictory opinions relies on the well known manzonian criterion of plausibility would socrates plausibly have said this thought that would he have inferred that but who is this socrates what do we know about him we currently know two things for sure firstly as far as we know there are established historical witnesses to the existence of socrates and secondly the task of establishing whether there is total convergence between the thoughts and

philosophies of socrates and plato lies beyond this author's remit and the scope of this work the second reference i intend to make is to a philosopher who in many ways shares house s outlook namely nietzsche this analogy essentially rests on a central claim that both have as ernst nolte said in a famous and controversial essay turned their bodies into battlefields both have gained an intimate knowledge of their body through its darkest and most horrendous aspect pain for both philosophising has had to painfully make its way in a jungle of suffering in these conditions no thought is taken for granted no inference is ever banal everything is earned at high price consequently every element in this context should occasionally be re considered as a non given element when normal gestures that are easy for everyone to make become complicated and reliant on the actor s inexhaustible will there s no longer a place you can call home a communal place you have to continuously invent your way there is no better condition for the researcher indeed for anyone who refuses the comfortable banality of everyday life whether detested or longed for from a methodological point of view this is a privileged situation as it allows us to examine everything to take nothing for granted and to see things where others no longer see anything the other analogy strictly linked to the first is the tendency to behave in a politically incorrect way taking drugs sex gambling and so on these are forms of behaviour which depend totally on the rejection of the ordinary as the sole rule of life and on the use of the self as a testing ground for the out of the ordinary the cynical behaviour that results is at this point obvious another analogy is in the rational method even if both nietzsche and house successfully use a rational method the former a philosophical method the latter a logical scientific method this does not mean that both are absolute rationalists as nietzsche sustains the dialectic method of the greek philosophers refuses emotions and rewards rational analysis however it retains an element of feeling in its roots and this is the pleasure in using the dialectic method itself the real passion is to philosophise meaning here exercising one s capacity to resolve philosophical problems dilemmas or as we d say nowadays brainteasers in a word puzzles

those yet to come who are already among the disappeared in this urgent work bell demonstrates that a radical reconfiguration of the understanding of politics is required in order to safeguard the future and human dignity of stateless persons

mechanical choices details the intimate connection that exists between morality and law the morality we use to blame others for their misdeeds and the criminal law that punishes them for these misdeeds this book shows how both law and morality presuppose the accuracy of common sense a centuries old psychology that defines people as rational agents who make honorable choices and act for just reasons it then shows how neuroscience is commonly taken to challenge these fundamental psychological assumptions such challenges four in number are distinguished from each other by the different neuroscientific facts from which they arise the fact that human choices are caused by brain events the fact that those choices don t cause the actions that are their objects but are only epiphenomenal to those choices the fact that those choices are identical to certain physical events in the brain and the fact that human subjects are quite fallible in their knowledge of what they are doing and why the body of this book shows how such challenges are either based on faulty facts or misconceived as to the relevance of such facts to responsibility the book ends with a detailed examination of the neuroscience of addiction an examination which illustrates how neuroscience can help rather than challenge both law and morality in their quest to accurately define excuses from responsibility
