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debate over the evolution of black english vernacular bev has permeated afro american studies creole linguistics dialectology and sociolinguistics for a quarter of a century with little sign of a satisfactory resolution primarily because evidence that bears directly on the earlier stages of bev is sparse this book brings together 11 transcripts of mechanical recordings of interviews with former slaves born well over a century ago it attempts to make this crucial source of data as widely known as possible and to explore its importance for the study of black english vernacular in view of various problems of textual composition and interpretation it does so by providing a complete description of the contents of the recordings by providing transcripts of most of the contents and by publishing a group of interpretive essays which examine the data in the light of other relevant historical cultural social and linguistic evidence and which provide contexts for interpretation and analysis in these essays a group of diverse scholars on bev analyze the same texts for the first

time the lack of consensus that emerges may seem surprising but in fact highlights some of the basic problems of textual composition and interpretation and of scholarly dispositions that underlie the study of bev the papers raise crucial questions about the evolution of bev about its relationship to other varieties and most important about the construction and interpretation of linguistic texts

of the thousands of books and articles on the black american english vernacular published in the last decade almost all have failed to examine closely the vocabulary of black english this book corrects that failing by going beyond popular treatments that overemphasize the language of the drug trade and of prostitution language j l dillard convincingly demonstrates which is only incidentally black since there is no full scale dictionary of black english available the present lexicon will be an indispensable work for blacks seeking to understand their own historic past and for all those who have been fascinated by the forcefulness and richness of this language from amazon com

in this book bryan reynolds argues that early modern england experienced a sociocultural phenomenon unprecedented in english history which has been largely overlooked by historians and critics beginning in the 1520s a distinct criminal culture of beggars vagabonds confidence tricksters prostitutes and gypsies emerged and flourished this community defined itself through its criminal conduct and dissident thought and was in turn officially defined by and against the dominant conceptions of english cultural normality examining plays popular pamphlets laws poems and scholarly work from the period reynolds demonstrates that this criminal culture though diverse was united by its own ideology language and aesthetic using his transversal theory he shows how the enduring presence of this criminal culture markedly influenced the mainstream culture s aesthetic sensibilities socioeconomic organization and systems of belief he maps the effects of the public theater s transformative force of transversality such as through the criminality represented by shakespeare jonson middleton and dekker on both elizabethan and jacobean society and the scholarship devoted to it

the goal of the oxford handbook of african american language is to provide readers with a wide range of analyses of both traditional and contemporary work on language use in african american communities in a broad collective the handbook offers a survey of language and its uses in african american communities from a wide range of contexts organized into seven sections origins and historical perspectives lects and variation structure and description child language acquisition and development education language in society and language and identity it is a handbook of research on african american language aal and as such provides a variety of scholarly perspectives that may not align with each other as is indicative of most scholarly research the chapters in this book interact with one another as contributors frequently refer the reader to further elaboration on and references to related issues and connect their own research to related topics in other chapters within their own sections and the handbook more generally to create dialogue about aal thus affirming the need for collaborative thinking about the issues in aal research though the handbook does not and cannot include every area of research it is meant to provide suggestions for future work on lesser studied areas e g variation heterogeneity in regional social and ethnic communities by highlighting a need for collaborative perspectives and innovative thinking while reasserting the need for better research and communication in areas thought to be resolved

a refreshingly clearheaded and taboo breaking look at race relations reveals that american culture is neither black nor white nor other but a mix a mongrel black like you is an erudite and entertaining exploration of race relations in american popular culture particularly compelling is strausbaugh s eagerness to tackle blackface a strange often scandalous and now taboo entertainment although blackface performance came to be denounced as purely racist mockery and shamefacedly erased from most modern accounts of american cultural history black like you shows that the impact of blackface on american culture was deep and long lasting its influence can be seen in rock and hiphop in vaudeville broadway and gay drag performances in mark twain and gangsta lit in the earliest filmstrips and the 2004 movie white chicks on radio and television in advertising and product marketing and even in the way americans speak strausbaugh enlivens themes that are rarely discussed in public let alone with such candor and vision american culture neither conforms to knee jerk racism nor to knee jerk political correctness it is neither black nor white nor other but a mix a mongrel no history is best forgotten however uncomfortable it may be to remember the power of blackface to engender mortification and rage in americans to this day is reason enough to examine what it tells us about our culture and ourselves blackface is still alive its impact and descendants including black performers in whiteface can be seen all around us today
