historical linguistic theory and practice consist of a large number of chronological layers that have been accepted in the course of time and have acquired a permanence of their own these range from neogrammarian conceptualizations of sound change analogy and borrowing to prosodic lexical morphological and syntactic change and to present day views on rule change and the effects of language contact to get a full grasp of the principles of historical linguistics it is therefore necessary to understand the nature of each of these layers this book is a major revision and reorganization of the earlier editions and adds entirely new chapters on morphological change and lexical change as well as a detailed discussion of linguistic palaeontology and ideological responses to the findings of historical linguistics to this landmark publication

originally published as the continuum companion to historical linguistics this book brings together a number of leading scholars who provide a combination of different approaches to current and new issues in historical linguistics while supplying an exhaustive and up to date coverage of sub fields traditionally regarded as central to historical linguistics research the editors aim to build a solid background for further discussion and to indicate directions for new research on relevant open questions the book includes coverage of key terms a list of resources and sections on history of research methodology phonology morphology grammatical categories syntax grammaticalization semantics etymology language contact sociolinguistics causes of language change it is a complete resource for researchers working on historical linguistics

bringing the advances of theoretical linguistics to the study of language change in a systematic way this innovative textbook demonstrates the mutual relevance of historical linguistics and contemporary linguistics numerous case studies throughout the book show both that theoretical linguistics can be used to solve problems where traditional approaches to historical linguistics have failed to produce satisfying results and that the results of historical research can have an impact on theory the book first explains the nature of human language and the sources of language change in broad terms it then focuses on different types of language change from contemporary viewpoints before exploring comparative reconstruction the most spectacular success of traditional historical linguistics and the problems inherent in trying to devise new methods for

this volume consists of 19 papers presented at the 16th international conference on historical linguistics which was held in august 2003 in copenhagen and drew the largest number of participants and the widest array of languages that this important biannual conference has ever had as with previous volumes the papers selected cover a wide range of subjects besides the core areas of historical linguistics and this time include studies on ethnolinguistics grammaticalisation language contact sociolinguistics and typology the individual languages treated include brazilian portuguese chukchi korean danish english german greek japanese kok papónk latin newar old norse romanian seneca spanish and swedish the volume reflects the state of the art both empirical and theoretical in historical linguistics today and shows the discipline to be as flourishing and capable of new advances as ever

the ten volumes of the handbook of pragmatics highlights focus on the most salient topics in the field of pragmatics thus dividing its wide interdisciplinary spectrum in a transparent and manageable way while the other volumes select specific philosophical cognitive grammatical cultural interactional or discursive angles this sixth volume focuses on the dynamic aspects of language and reviews the relevant developments in variationist and diachronic scholarship the areas explored in the volume concern several general themes specific methodological approaches from comparative reconstruction to evolutionary pragmatics issues in intra lingual variation in terms of standard and non standard varieties cross linguistic variation including its cross cultural dimension and the study of diachronic relations across linguistic patterns including changes in all areas of pragmatic patterns and categories the contributions document two prominent and interrelated trends that shape contemporary variationist and diachronic research one it has moved from situating change within context independent systems toward incorporating patterns of language use and the speaker's role in language change and two it has reoriented its focus away from cataloguing instances of variation and toward seeking theoretically informed accounts that aim at explaining variation and change on the whole the volume argues for accepting and developing actively a systematic connection between research in diachrony synchronic variation and typology while also incorporating the socio cognitive perspective in linguistic analysis as a particularly promising source of useful methodology and explanatory models
