a memoir of childhood summers spent in a laurentian village and of an indian woman who lived according to her ancient code of courage and humanity a heartwarming story from the trade paperback edition

this vivid memoir recounts the experience of shudha mazumdar a woman born at the turn of the century to indian parents whose ideas on child rearing differed greatly her father a wealthy europeanized zamindar tried to instill western values while shudha s mother emphasized the traditional even going as far as arranging a marriage for her daughter when she was thirteen although true to indian traditions shudha eventually manifested her father s influence by becoming a published writer by becoming a member of a number of social service organizations and by serving as the indian delegate to the international labour organization

the indian woman a picture of poise an image of intellect an exposition of enterprise she doesn t just nurture the social cultural and spiritual traditions of india by strengthening the ancient civilization s family values and secular ethos but also nourishes the young nation s spirit of

entrepreneurship by playing a stellar role across professions businesses and industries this iconoclastic book captures fascinating journeys of some of the most celebrated indian women from the iconic lata mangeshkar to the fiery mary kom from the legendary bhanu athaiya to the brilliant kiran mazumdar shaw for the first time they all come together to share their inspiring experiences in their own words with contributions by lata mangeshkar kiran mazumdar shaw bhanu athaiya shahnaz husain sunita narain naina lal kidwai fathima beevi padma bandopadhyay gita gopinath mc mary kom a collector s item this creatively conceptualized and beautifully designed book provides deep insights into the mind of this great nation and its women and succeeds in passing on the enduring legacy to future generations

this book focuses on subjugated indentured indian women who are constantly faced with race gender caste and class oppression and inequality on overseas european owned plantations but who are also armed with latent links to the women s abolition movements in the homeland also examining their post indenture life it employs a paradigm of male dominated indian women in india at the margins of an enduringly patriarchal society a persisting backdrop to the huge 19th century post slavery movement of the agricultural indentured workforce drawn largely from india this book depicts the antithetical and contradictory explanations for the indentured indian women s cries degradation and dehumanization and how the politics of change and control impacted their social organization and its legacy the book owes its origins to the 2017 centennial commemorative event celebrating 100 years of the abolition of the indenture system of indian labor that victimized and dehumanized indians from 1834 through 1917

grappling with childhood issues grieving the loss of a dead brother fighting to erase the scars of domestic violence struggling as a single parent in a man s world neerja finally resolves to end her suffering how only her tale will tell neerja is the evolution the new face voice and genre of indian spirituality neerja invites every individual to own their soul space her message anchors the readers who are on their tumultuous odysseys during these unprecedented times perhaps hand in hand with neerja they can find a solution to their travails

walking towards ourselves is an anthology of autobiographical narratives based on the real lived experiences of indian women writers the pieces explore what it means to be an indian woman contributors write on issues such as love sexuality taboos marriage motherhood literacy career choices dating and definitions of success for women walking towards ourselves represents multiple perspectives and a range of voices giving readers insight into the richness and complexities of contemporary indian women s lives

the multi disciplinary and comprehensive collection of articles presented in this volume provides a valuable discussion on the status and role of the women in development of the society till recently women were treated on a different pedestal depriving them of their rights but reminding them of their duties but with the changing times the role of women has changed from child bearing and rearing to bread earner this book brings under one cover the role of women in the changing society and their changing roles under the broad categories of health education employment politics popular movements and development

the result of extensive archival recovery work ellen brinks s study fills a significant gap in our understanding of women s literary history of the south asian subcontinent under colonialism and of indian women's contributions and responses to developing cultural and political nationalism as brinks shows the invisibility of anglophone indian women writers cannot be explained simply as a matter of colonial marginalization or as a function of dominant theoretical approaches that reduce indian women to the status of figures or tropes the received narrative that british imperialism in india was perpetuated with little cultural contact between the colonizers and the colonized population is complicated by writers such as toru dutt krupabai satthianadhan pandita ramabai cornelia sorabji and sarojini naidu all five women found large audiences for their literary works in india and in great britain and all five were also deeply rooted in and connected to both south asian and western cultures their works created new zones of cultural contact and exchange that challenge postcolonial theory s tendencies towards abstract notions of the colonized women as passive and of english as a de facto instrument of cultural domination brinks s close readings of these texts suggest new ways of reading a range of issues central to postcolonial studies the relationship of colonized women to the metropolitan literary culture indian and english women s separate and joint engagements in reformist and nationalist struggles the translatability of culture the articulation strategies and complex negotiations of self identification of anglophone indian women writers and the significance and place of cultural difference

although indian women s short fiction has always enjoyed equal importance and popularity as their novels very little critical attention has been paid to it so far indian women s short fiction seeks to fulfil this long felt need it puts together fifteen perceptive and analytical articles by scholars across the world the articles which are focussed on native indian writing as well as diasporic short fiction deal with such interesting literary issues as construction of femininity disablement and enablement bengali heritage hybrid identities nostalgia representation of the partition violence tradition and modernity and cultural perspectivism it is hoped that the book will prove useful to scholars interested in short fiction studies in general and indian women s short fiction in particular

wars i and ii leading to independence this publication recorded and participated in the most pivotal moment in modern indian history and did so by appealing to both the conservative and progressive socio political urges marking the era

an innovative analysis of how ideas of indian identity negotiated within the indian diaspora in trinidad affect cultural identities back home in india

india s endemic gender based violence has received increased international scrutiny and provoked waves of domestic protest and activism in recent years related studies on india and south asia have proliferated but their analyses often fail to identify why violence flourishes unwilling to simply accept patriarchy as the answer tamsin bradley presents new research examining how different groups in india conceptualise violence against women revealing beliefs around religion caste and gender that render aggression socially acceptable she also analyses the role that neoliberalism and its corollary consumerism play in reducing women to commodity objects for barter or exchange unpacking varied conservative liberal and neoliberal ideologies active in india today bradley argues that they can converge unexpectedly to normalise violence against women due to these complex and overlapping factors rates of violence against women in india have actually increased despite decades of feminist campaigning this book will be crucial to those studying indian gender politics and violence but also presents new data and methodologies which have practical implications for researchers and policymakers worldwide

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
